Obtains and secures the Emergency Medical Services Transport records Documents trauma team activation times and response times for the trauma surgeon, and other MD specialists on the flow sheet Controls the admission of students into the room, assigns tasks.

Office of Emergency Medical Services Emergency Medical Technician Curriculum March 2, 1998 This course is designed to instruct a student to the level of Emergency Medical Technician who serves as a vital link in the chain of the health care team. It is recognized that the majority of prehospital emergency medical care will be provided by the EMT.

Injury is an increasingly significant health problem throughout the world, accounting for 16 per cent of the global burden of disease.
